

# Permit-Required Confined Spaces



Permit-required confined spaces are spaces that may be entered by employees or contractors and that are hazardous due to their configuration and associated physical or atmospheric dangers. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) requires that employees who are to enter permit-required confined spaces be provided with an effective confined space entry program and training. The specific requirements are detailed in 29 CFR 1910.146.
